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Remembering a glorious rebel

Was not the kingdom of God that Jesus held up but the forerunner to socialism, social justice, secularism and democracy? He was a raging egalitarian, an invisible socialist, and an economic democrat.

Jesus, born of humble parents in Bethlehem, rose as a glorious phenomenon. He became a world wonder of spiritual-temporal revolution against an imperial establishment and a corrupt priestly order. Judas Iscariot betrayed his master for a few pieces of silver. Every barbarity from those treacherous days still exists, indeed in magnified malignancy, to victimise the have-not humanity and slay the radical humanist and activist.

Lofty testament

For all of humankind, Jesus' magnificent, yet militant, teaching was a lofty testament of egalitarian liberation from obscurantist faith, authoritarian politics, theological orthodoxy and big business freebooting. Similarly, the ring of his message constituted a de facto revolt against Roman imperialism, absolutist injustice and priest-proud godism. He stood for a higher culture marked by a sacred, sublime, compassionate ethos, and a divinity of humanity that is free from crass, class-mired materialism and gross, greedy, grabbing riches. This rare man of Nazareth resisted Jewish ecclesiastical domination, opposed discrimination among brothers and demanded, in God's name, socio-economic justice. This is the essence of the Jesus jurisprudence of human dignity, inner divinity and fraternal obligation to help every brother in distress.

Born into a carpenter's family, Jesus lived a sage and simple life and chose his disciples from a weaker section of society — indigent fishermen. He symbolised a revolutionary change in the theological-temporal establishment and advocated social justice and divinity, dignity and equity in the social order. Such a transformation was the truth of the kingdom of heaven, which was a challenge to the Roman Empire, the Jewish priestocracy and the arbitrary justice system that then prevailed. H.G Wells wrote: "This doctrine of the Kingdom of Heaven, which was the main teaching of Jesus, is certainly one of the most revolutionary doctrines that ever stirred and changed human thought. It is small wonder if, the world of that time [and of our time, if this writer may add] failed to grasp its full significance, and recoiled in dismay from even a half apprehension of its tremendous challenges to the established habits and institutions of mankind."

Rare daring

Jesus, the glorious rebel, proclaimed the reality of a universal moral order. He called it the kingdom of heaven and told

the people that the kingdom of god was indeed within them. He outraged the hypocrites who did their commerce inside the temples and the shrines. He drove them out with rare daring. Now, right before our eyes, our temples and churches are again centres of big business.

Jesus, to the anger of the proprietariat, resisted the commercialisation of god and the commoditisation of man. Big temples, great churches, god-men, bishops, mullahs and acharyas are a mundane part of the capitalist establishment and are anti-Jesus in spirit. India's Constitution mandates equality, secularism and economic democracy. What a marvel it was that Jesus preached ages ago — that God was equal in granting his favours to all, as was the sun. Jesus was a raging egalitarian, an invisible socialist, an economic democrat. Proof of this lies in his parables and preaching.

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus cast scorn upon that natural tendency we all obey, to glorify our own people and to minimise the righteousness of other creeds and races. In the parable of the labourers he thrust aside the obstinate claim of the Jewish people to have a sort of first mortgage upon God. All whom God takes into the kingdom, he taught, he serves alike. There is no distinction in his treatment, because there is no measure to his bounty. There are no privileges, no rebates, and no excuses. H.G. Wells has presented these propositions in The Outline of History.

Barabbas jurisprudence

The abolition of poverty is a socialist feature of the societal structure. In order to wipe every tear of grief from every eye, you need a social transformation and an economic regeneration, a special concern for women and children, and a rage against those who rob the people's resources. This is the majesty and humanity of true spirituality that was absent during the era of Emperor Tiberius. It was his administration and justice delivery system, presided over in the region by Pontius Pilate, which decreed, with perverse judicial power and under pressure from the priestly class and in exercise of state authority that Jesus, who argued for the kingdom of heaven, be put to the cross. When treason was the charge and the priestly order was exposed by the accused, there was terrific pressure on the Governor-judge to sentence him. The same judge set free Barabbas. Even today innocence suffers state punishment and robbery rides state power. Barabbas jurisprudence is in currency even today.

Jesus spoke for all time

and all mankind when he, bed-rocked on the spiritual philosophy of the kingdom of god, told that court this truth of human rights and social justice. His advocacy of the humanist culture as the ultimate value, as against obscurantist godism, is evident from the admonition that sabbath is for man, not man for sabbath.

Advocate of unity and fraternity

Jesus advocated the unity and fraternity of humanity, like the doctrine of Advaita that Adi Sankara propagated as an upanishadic fundamental. Not only did he strike at patriotism and the bonds of family loyalty in the name of God's universal fatherhood and the brotherhood of all mankind, his teaching condemned all the gradations of the economic system, all private wealth, and personal advantage. He said: "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a rich man to enter into the Kingdom of God."

To my mind, this glorious dimension of the kingdom of god is the forerunner to socialism, social justice, secularism and democracy. The life of Jesus was absolute simplicity, matchless humility, compassionate humanity, gender reverence and pro-poor egalite. He washed the feet of his disciples, he defined

godist superstition. To share and care for your neighbour, even your enemy, were the fundamentals he taught. He was thus a pioneer of world brotherhood, who advocated freedom from dogmas and obscurantist cults. Such a universalism is the testament of Jesus. This is the Christianity to be practised daily — not the Christianity for a Sunday ritual, or for an alibi to hold the world under imperial might and big business power. Not showy charity coupled with mighty rapacity. The Buddha was a predecessor of Jesus. The Mahatma whom Churchill called "the half-naked fakir" was his successor.

Yet, Jesus if born today will meet Pilate's justice yet again. Barabbas is in power everywhere again. Judas the pretentious disciple and arch-betrayer is a subtle and slight presence practising diplomacy — the Cross in one hand and nuke bomb in the other. The terrorist incarnation today masquerades as the ruler of the earth.

The resurrection of the world and the elimination of the sufferings and slavery of millions are desiderata for many a million honest disciples of Jesus. Even so, the finest teachings of Jesus have perished, and the world today suffers a grave decline in the values of humanism, compassion, morality and divinity. Greed, vulgarity and the collapse of the public good have been a shock and a shame, a

terror and a horror.

Structural splendour

Resurrection, not in the lexical or biblical sense, but in the grand moral dimension of the term conveying the spirit of trans-material mutation, is the structural splendour of the world order. Peace, not war; stability, not subservience; high morality, not any grab-based acquisitive success, is the new ethic. Exploitation has become the rule of law, and equity and justice have become the vanishing point of international jurisprudence.

The hidden agenda after a unipolar world is the malignant methodology of insatiable accumulation of wealth. This terrible trend must be trampled under the foot by a triumphant and dynamic generation. This should be done with socialist convictions and a profound prognosis — of work, wealth and happiness for every human being. This should be the 'developmental drama' of the New World Order.

Hindu Taliban

MANGALORE — People in the Indian port city of Mangalore are increasingly becoming hostage to the notorious Hindu militia Sri Ram Sene, described by many as India's Taliban. "We have been molested and humiliated in the name of God and country by people who obviously have no regard for either of the two," one woman who has been attacked by Sri Ram Sene militia told The Hindu on Tuesday, January 27.

Police have arrested dozens of the Hindu militant group members after they assaulted women in a pub in Mangalore in the western Karnataka state on Saturday.

Pramod Mutalik, leader of the Sri Ram Sene in Karnataka, said they were trying to safeguard Indian culture and the dictates of Hinduism.

But for the victims, the brutality practised by the militia members is simply unjustifiable.

"The entire scene has been playing out in my mind over and over again," recalled the assaulted woman, refusing to give her name fearing reprisal.

She said that before barging into the pub, the mob of over 40 -- all wearing saffron headbands and scarves -- went into a huddle and prayed silently.

"Once inside, they went

straight for the women guests. They rounded them up at the center of the dance floor and then started beating them mercilessly."

The attack was filmed and then broadcast on national television, which showed the militia members chasing and beating up the panicking women.

"One of them stripped a girl and groped her. She was also badly beaten up," said the woman.

"They were laughing when they were doing all this. It was just fun for them."

She said that many of the victims are planning to launch a protest on the streets to voice opposition to the Hindu militias' actions.

"We want to tell the world that we will not tolerate the growth of a Taliban-style group in this city."

Political Game

The state's ruling party, the Hindu-nationalist Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), is facing fierce criticism over the attacks.

Many national newspapers and television reports say such aggressions could have only happened in a Hindu-nationalist governed state.

"Is this the direction that BJP governments want the country to head towards?" the Mail

Today asked in an editorial.

The Polit Bureau party said the BJP government "had not acted firmly" against the Hindu group "responsible for a series of attacks on churches in Mangalore and targeting Christians in other places."

Political analysts believe the BJP's weak response is a purely political ploy.

Many believe the Hindu-nationalist party is giving its blessings to such acts to lure Hindu voters before the May general elections.

"Before the elections the BJP want to show a more benign face," Amulya Ganguli, a political analyst, told Reuters on Tuesday, January 27.

The BJP, which now governs or shares power in 12 Indian states, has in the past defended hardline Hindu groups and raked up communally sensitive issues such as banning cow slaughter, revered by Hindus but eaten as beef by Muslims, and opposed special marriage laws for Muslims.

"It's a calculated experiment," believes analyst N. Bhaskara Rao.

"It's a strategy towards polarizing voters."

For the judges' sakes

The manner in which the Supreme Court has responded to the Information Commission's ruling on the disclosure of information regarding judges' assets compromises not just the idea of accountability, but the idea of the rule of law itself. Members of the court have raised several legal points about the scope of the RTI Act and the status of the court's own resolution on declaration of assets adopted in 1997. But in the very process of quibbling over legal technicalities, it has compromised the essence of the rule of law in five different ways. First, and most straightforwardly, it has lent credence to those who think double standards are involved in the court's refusal to disclose information on assets of judges. The court has itself, in a number of decisions been making strong pronouncements about the fact that public officials should disclose their assets. By exempting itself from standards it is imposing on other functionaries, the court has weakened the authority of its own claims. The irony is that the original petition didn't even ask for the public declaration of assets; it asked whether any declarations had in fact been made under the 1997 resolution.

Second, judges could claim that they are unlike other public officials. But so far, in all the pronouncements that have

emerged, the Court has actually not given any serious Constitutional argument for why they should be exempt from such revelations. In other countries arguments have been made for exempting the judiciary on some interpretation of the doctrine of separation of powers. Whether one agrees with this line of argument is beside the point. The more important issue is that in the debate in India the issue has not been framed in terms of Constitutional first principles at all.

Third, the Court undermines its own authority as an institution by effectively rubbishing a resolution on disclosure passed by a full Court meeting of twenty-two judges. This particular resolution may not, strictly, have the status of law. But by effectively downgrading its status and denying its binding character, the Court has rendered toothless the authority of its own resolutions. If indeed the Court wanted to depart from that resolution, the least it could do is pass another resolution and explain why it did so.

Fourth, we can debate the technicalities of the law. But there is something unseemly about the Supreme Court seeking relief from a High Court in matters pertaining to it. If the Court has the courage of its Constitutional convictions it should make a first principles Constitutional argument. But

the idea that a court that is in some senses subordinate to you, whose personnel are under your hierarchical powers, should be asked to pronounce on a matter in which justices of the Supreme Court have expressed opinions is distinctly odd. Cumulatively, what this case implicates is not just accountability, but double standards, lack of Constitutional argumentation, undermining of institutional rules within the Court, and violation of commonsensical rules of hierarchy.

But, perhaps more egregiously, the Court's attitude tells us something larger about the way it thinks of the rule of law. There seems to be a lot of concern about possible misuse of the mechanism. But this is a distinctly odd concern. The solution to this is to have mechanisms that protect judges by distinguishing legitimate and illegitimate complaints. But to make this concern a decisive factor would be to undermine the idea of the rule of law, since possible misuse is potentially true of almost any norm. Second, there seems to be lot of second-guessing about what the disclosure of assets might do the judges' authority. But here there is a fallacy involved. Very little credit is being given to popular opinion. The fact that many judges are enormously wealthy will not, by itself, be a

cause of consternation against judges. It has not mattered much in the case of politicians, and most people, unlike intellectuals, look to the substance of arguments, not their class origin. And most people understand that good lawyers can legitimately accumulate vast assets. The two circumstances under which wealth will matter are these: first, if there is an aura of illegality or underreporting in the judges' known assets. I suspect the real fear is that many judges will have assets in property; and this is a class of assets that carry the aura of being compromised. But by giving this fear credence the judges are already acknowledging a widespread complicity. Second, disclosures would matter if there is a disproportionate and unexplained increase in assets after becoming a judge. This is really the core area of concern for citizens. But arguably full disclosure will help the judiciary because it will remove a source of unwarranted speculation.

As Fali Nariman's creditable stand and the public clamour is making clear, the Supreme Court's interpretation of the rule of law may win the technical legal battle, but it risks losing in the Court of morality and history. The Court is acquiring the reputation of being one of the most untransparent institutions in matters such as appointments.

It is not clear that its authority runs even over its own High Courts.

Just last month the Supreme Court rightly hauled up the Orissa High Court, which had passed an egregious judgment in a rape case. The Supreme Court said "A bare reading of the High Court's order shows a complete non-application of mind. Some of the conclusions are clearly contrary to the law as laid down by this Court. The conclusions are not only confusing but border on the absurd. It baffles us as to why the high court says that 'law is well settled that it is not possible for a single man to commit sexual intercourse with a healthy adult female in full possession of her senses against her will. To say the least, the conclusion is not only contrary to law laid down by this court, but also shows scant regard for law declared by this Court."

This case may be particularly sensational, but it points to a broader trend where the idea of the rule of law is becoming more difficult to institutionalise within the judiciary. Law depends fundamentally on authority; honourable judges would do well to remember that the assets issue is not about holding them accountable, it is about maintaining their authority.

Sri Ram Sena should be strongly disciplined; its origins thoroughly investigated

Sri Ram Sena should be strongly disciplined; its origins thoroughly investigated. We join all right-thinking people in condemning the criminal assault on a group of women at a Mangalore pub by hooligans operating under the banner of the Sri Ram Sena. We remind the public that this group (whose name has been spelt as it is in phonetic loyalty to the Kannada language) is the same as the Sri Ram Sena, which carried out an attack on an exhibition mounted by Sahmat in August last year, celebrating M.F. Husain's contributions to Indian art. We take note of the hurried and deeply embarrassed statements by the leaders of the Hindutva cultural fraternity, dissociating themselves from the Mangalore atrocity. Yet we denounce their concurrent assumption of the power to legislate on what social practices are true and what are not, in their relationship with Indian culture. These are not decisions to be made by a sectarian political leadership. The Sri Ram Sena was little heard of or known, till it attacked the exhibition that Sahmat mounted in August to protest the exclusion of M.F. Husain's work from a

major display and sale of Indian art that was mounted at that time. Sahmat sounded the alarm then about this debutant group, a spawn of the Bajrang Dal and the Vishwa Hindu Parishad, both credentialed members of the Hindutva family. And Sahmat has continued to warn about the dangers posed by the new organisation within the Hindutva fold, which has been showing the kind of destructive energy that belies its fledgling, newborn, character.

Clearly, the Sri Ram Sena has emerged out of the campaign of hatred and intolerance that the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and its affiliates within the broader Hindutva parivar launched many years back. The BJP leadership has issued some hasty and embarrassed statements distancing itself from the atrocities in Mangalore. But these have little credibility, since the BJP continues to make political capital out of the legacy of its baleful campaign of moral majoritarianism. We call for the immediate arrest and prosecution of all those who have participated in this atrocity in Mangalore, or contributed to it in any fashion. The prosecution

should be purposive and should address all individuals who bear constructive responsibility for creating the climate of intolerance that made this criminal assault possible. We urge the investigating agencies to pay attention to the growing evidence that this is about more than an art exhibition or about an incident in Mangalore that may seem trivial in relation to the scale of atrocities perpetrated in the last two decades by the agents of majority communalism. It has been credibly reported that the elements who directed the Mangalore attacks were in intimate contact with individuals currently being prosecuted for their culpability in the Malegaon bomb blasts of September 29 last year. The individual identified as the leader of the assault on Sahmat's exhibition last August, was also the principal agent of a severe transgression of the basic ethos of academic life, when he spat at a college lecturer who had been invited to a discussion on the scourge of terrorism at Delhi University in November. Again, the Sri Ram Sena drew its moral

and ideological sustenance from the Hindutva parivar, since the Akhil Bharatiya Vidyarthi Parishad, a recognised affiliate of the family, had prepared the ground for this act of barbarity, by pronouncing an anathema on the college lecturer invited to speak about his first-hand experiences as a victim of so-called "terrorism" investigations. The Mangalore incident shows that terrorism has several manifestations and multiple protagonists. We appeal to the public to break out of the template on terrorism that has been moulded by the Hindutva parivar and to recognise that all offences against civilised norms of conduct and the rule of law, contribute to the triumph of terrorism. The police and investigating agencies, we urge, should not fail this test of standing up for the rule of law. Regrettably, their conduct over the last many years gives us little confidence that they will. Finally, we would like to appeal to the media to evolve a set of norms on the coverage of such acts of criminality. We do not go along with the stricture handed down by Karnataka's Director-General of Police, that the media

should have informed the authorities of this criminal gang's intent once it got advance notice. This is an issue that each media professional should resolve in accordance with his or her own sense of civic responsibility and his or her own ethical commitment. We do believe however, that the media should evolve a credible set of norms on the coverage of criminal acts that it has advance notice of. Clearly, the Mangalore hoodlums staged their criminal act in the belief that they would, through the breathless reporting of India's booming and thoroughly irresponsible electronic media, enjoy a few minutes of nationwide fame. If the media were to deny moral vigilantes the coverage that they so desperately seek, it would deny them the oxygen of publicity that they flourish on. Media professionals need, in this context, to clearly lay down the norm that they will not succumb to competitive pressures and provide any variety of coverage to the perpetrators of criminal actions, even when these are dressed up in moral and political terms.

Exposer of DDA scandal continues

So far, the government agencies could not go beyond the inputs that were fed by Indian Justice Party. In the month of October, 2008, it came to the knowledge of Dr. Udit Raj that the dealers were cheating by submitting false applications on behalf of SCs and STs. Dealers, in collusion with officers, fabricated false documents in the name of SC and ST candidates and even if there was no forgery of papers, poor SCs and STs people were allured to sign documents and after the allotment, they would be paid handsome amount.
